Firstly, how do E cigarettes actually work? 
### Teacher's Favourite Book




The club is for any pupils wishing to learn more about drama; put into practice their drama skills and even take part in their own play.

**Author:** Anthony Doerr



### Parvovirus warning for dog owners



### **Bully XLs: Cute or Killer?**

The dog: a loveable, affectionate, tail wagging creature with a heart of gold towards humans. However, a new breed has emerged from the shadows with a harsher bite than bark. The Bully XL, with a ferocious name, a scissor set of teeth, and a killer instinct, let's analyse some pros and cons of these flesh eating teddy bears.

First of all, let's talk about the normal common dog, there are many breeds, Labradors, Poodles, Cockapoos, Dachshunds. All loveable puppies, yet, sometimes breeds with two of these, Labradoodles have emerged from the shadows and the man inventing these, Wally Conron, explained he regrets these actions as it encouraged people to use the Poodle as their canvas and create many different Poodle mixes. It has finally been confirmed that they will no longer be allowed into the country, but this will spark new problems, people who already own them will be outraged, perhaps, and some might have grown to love their bearish brute. But the ban has been added to the law, one person stated they "Bred them for drug dealers," and this is a statement that raises further questions, is the aggression natural or does it develop based on the way they are bred or developed? So, the confirmation of the ban has already happened, but do you agree with this? The loved, loveable, loving pet has lost it;s first breed, but could more bans on more breeds still occur? Only time will tell.

What's your thoughts? Here's what Mrs Graham and Mr Sheerin had to say on this terrifying topic:

"I was expecting a ban when the case originally happened. No attacks near me, but it's still a terrifying prospect. The way it's brought up depends. I've seen a lot around and the number hasn't depleted since the ban. I do take safety precautions around any dog, I don't let my kids near any dogs no matter what breed it is because it's a scary world out there. It is certainly dangerous walking around a park and seeing dogs like that off lead, now I've got kids I'm hyper alert. I do not, however, believe that a small, miniscule dog like a Dachshund or a Cockapoo could be as aggressive as an American Bully." - Mrs Graham.

"The first time I knew of bully XLs as a breed was when they first came to the country and when I first heard reports of attacks. Strange that a breed of dog was making multiple attacks because you'll hear about attacks, but never multiple at once, first impressions were it was something to do with the breed of dog. I am conflicted with the decision to ban them because any breed of dog could become violent with a bad owner, and with this breed of dog, if it becomes unhappy and violent it'll be a lot worse than a chihuahua. It's bad to see a dog with a reputation like this, based on balance it is certain they should ban them based on reputation." – Mr Sheerin

### Where does halloween come from?

### Christmas Special Recipe Gingerbread

#### You Will Need:

100g	Salted butter
3 tbsp	Golden syrup
100g	Dark muscovado sugar
1/2 tsp	Bicarbonate of soda
1 tbsp	ground ginger
1 tbsp	ground cinnamon
225g	plain flour
50g	icing sugar



#### Step one:

Heat the butter, syrup and sugar together in a pan stirring occasionally until melted. Then put aside to cool

#### Step two:

Mix the bicarbonate of soda, ginger, cinnamon and flour in a mixing bowl. Pour the buttery syrup into the mixing bowl and bring together until a dough. Add a tbs of milk if needed. Put in fridge once its soft, it will become firm in the fridge

#### Step three:

Put the dough onto a backing sheet and roll it out so it's about 1/2 cm thick. then refrigerate again for an hour.

#### Step four:

Heat the oven to 180c on a fan oven. Take dough out of the fridge and cut it into shapes, place shapes onto a baking tray with parchment paper.

#### Step five:

Space the shape, spread apart, and back for 10-12 mins. Depending on size you may need more or less time baking. Leave to cool completely

#### Step six:

Mix icing sugar with 1-2 tbsp, make a consistency that's thick but pipable. Ice the gingerbread with piping bag and nozzle.
