Wallace High Hosts BBC Question Time... Wallace High was very proud, on Thursday 17th November, to be the chosen venue for the national broadcast of BBC Question Time, with David Dimbleby and panel members including Kwasi Kwarteng MP, Chris Bryant MP, and John Nicolson MP.





This provided an excellent opportunity for our young people and staff to observe all the technical, backstage preparation that goes into a television broadcast and the challenge of presenting an audience debate show that covers topical political issues.

The BBC proved an excellent partner and were happy to accommodate a group of twenty pupils who attended the technical rehearsal at 1515, where Director, Rob Hopkin, met them to talk through the technical set up and covered topics such as sound, lighting and camera operation.

A further twenty pupils (plus staff) then had the pleasure of attending David Dimbleby's rehearsal, just one and a half hours before filming.

Five of those pupils (Lauren Roberts, Rhys Williamson, Lana Crow, Rebecca Carmichael and Amber Matheson) served as a substitute panel and others acted as a mock audience, all helping the BBC prepare for the broadcast.

This was an excellent event and we would like to thank the BBC and all involved for including our school community so fully in the production.



The Magic of Chemistry!...

P6 Challenge Days...



Already this year we have welcomed over 90 P6 pupils to Wallace and look forward to welcoming more again in January. Family Learning Event - Numeracy...

In October we held our first ever Family Learning event in the Maths department. This gave parents a snapshot of the teaching that is happening every day within the Mathematics classrooms. The workshop was well received and parents highlighted that some of the strategies young people are using to solve problems are different from the ones they were taught at school!

Maths Champions...

This year has seen the start of the Maths Champion Programme. Nineteen S6 pupils have been working with S1 and S2 pupils to support and challenge using a 'Paired Maths' approach. The aims are to increase confidence in Numeracy and basic Maths skills. The Champions are also working with a group of pupils to provide more of an opportunity to experience challenge in Maths. Working through ex-



tension work and UKMT Maths Challenge questions, lots of number discussion and debate has been generated.

Numeracy Passport

S1 pupils were issued with a Numeracy Passport in September this year allowing them to highlight the importance of Numeracy across the curriculum and,



more importantly, how they themselves use Numeracy in all subjects and in their everyday lives. Pupils were asked to complete their passports each time they used their Numeracy skills. SIX pupils were chosen by the Maths Department as the inaugural Numeracy Passport Winners: Sophie Lafferty, Evie McKenzie, Daniel Mackin, Tom McKay, Katie Smith and Oliwia Rzesotarska.



Kelvingrove Visit...



Senior pupils visited the Kelvingrove Art Gallery for a critical workshop on Alfonse Mucha. This was a fantastic one-off experience for the pupils to actually see the art work in real life. This experience has stimulated the pupils and given them a great insight into this famous artist's work.

The Clothes Show...



25 of Wallace High School's 'fashionistas' attended the Clothes Show in Birmingham, an amazing experience for the pupils and staff. There were talks from industry experts, textile workshops, career advice, trend presentations and this culminated in a spectacular Fashion Show. Everyone had a fantastic time. We were also lucky enough to meet and talk with Caryn Franklin one of the founders of the Clothes Show, she was an inspiration to listen to and she spoke with our pupils about their fashion and textile work within school.

Higher Photography...

At the start of October pupils from our Higher Photography class had the opportunity to work with staff from Stills, Scotland's Centre for Photography on a day-and-a-half workshop at the National Museum of Scotland. They were able to access clothes from the museum's clothing collection, set up photo shoots within the museum and experience using professional lighting and digital editing programmes to produce photographic work which was then exhibited at the museum. Lessons from Auschwitz....



In September, we were chosen from a group of pupils to represent Wallace High School in the Lessons from Auschwitz project. To start we had to attend a seminar in Glasgow, where we found out about what we would be doing as part of this experience. It was here that we also heard a testimony from a Holocaust survivor, Eva Clarke, and were told of her family's struggle and her upbringing before and during the war as a result of anti-Semitism in Nazi Germany.

Hearing Eva speak about her early life in a concentration camp and how only her mother and her survived from her entire family, allowed us to reflect on the horrific events of the Holocaust and reminded us of the significance to not think of the Holocaust as a statistical horror, but remember that each life lost had a story to be heard.

The next stage of this experience allowed us to go to Poland and visit Auschwitz-Birkenau, a death and concentration camp which saw the deaths of thousands of not only Jewish, but disabled, Romany gypsies and homosexual Europeans. Visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau in person was a harrowing yet rewarding experience, as it allowed us to comprehend the scale and horror of these death camps, and try to understand the atrocities that took place there. As part of our lessons from Auschwitz project we will be holding whole school assemblies from 30th of January 2017 to raise awareness of the events of the Holocaust and to ask people to reflect on its relevance in society today.

This was an incredible experience for us and we would encourage other seniors to get involved with the project in the future.

"It's all about me" Mental Health ...

Since returning back after summer, our young people and staff have been continuing to work hard developing our mental health initiative, *"it's all about me*". Here is a snap shot of what we have been doing to end the stigma of mental health and to support our young people.

Mental Health Champions...

40 pupils have volunteered to become *Mental Health Champions* for the school. Their role is to help end the stigma of mental health, be the pupil voice, work with *See Me* and help fundraise for *SAMH*. In the coming months, the Mental Health Champions have planned to carry out some research, with their peers, to find out about specific issues affecting young people in each year group.

See Me resources...

As a pilot school for *See Me*, we have been trialling new mental health lessons and resources called *"What's on your mind?"* with our S9/o pupils. The feedback about the lessons has been very positive. The young people feel more informed about what mental health conditions and are becoming increasingly confident asking questions and seeking support.

Modern Apprenticeships Insights...



Wallace High School, in partnership with Stirling Council, is piloting a ground-breaking Apprenticeships Insights programme. Following our year-round discussions on intended future pathways, a group of young people who have expressed an interest in undertaking a Modem Apprenticeship have explored a range of opportunities within Stirling Council.

Following a detailed introduction to the features and benefits of a Modern Apprenticeship, participants have visited departments such as Facilities Management, Housing Repair and Road Engineering.

During each visit, experienced colleagues from Stirling Council share their experiences and offer personalised 'hands on' experiences. Nathan Binnie, S5, has found the programme really useful. "It's been great to get out and see what happens in so many different Modern Apprenticeships. I'm really keen to get in to construction, and I have already talked about what I have learned at my careers advisor appointment" he said. With strong initial feedback from young people, teachers and employers, it is proposed that the pilot will extend to explore an even wider variety of Modern Apprenticeships.

Careers and Apprenticeships Fair...

On 7 November Wallace High School hosted 30 employers, apprenticeship providers and training organisations at the 2016 Careers and Apprenticeships Fair. Mr Smith (Employability and Partnerships), Mr Kerr (Pupil Support) and Fiona Lafferty (Skills Development Scotland) ensured that a wide range of both local and national exhibitors were present.

Over 400 young people from S3 through to S6 attended the event during the afternoon, with parents and carers visiting in the evening. For junior pupils it was an early opportunity to discover the value of apprenticeships and training, whilst senior pupils had the chance to further their knowledge of a diverse mix of industries. It was the wide range of local and regional exhibitors which made the event so popular. Emma McMaster, an S6 pupil, praised the event for this and felt that "the Careers and Apprenticeships Fair gives everybody the chance to meet with employers, to find out what they are really looking for from young people."

The visiting companies also commended the event as John Mott from the Institution of Civil Engineers stated that the knowledge gained from a brief conversation is highly beneficial. "This is an excellent way for pupils to get first hand expertise on careers", said John.

Mr Smith summed up the energetic atmosphere by saying "It's great to see so many young people and employers along with college and training providers having so many conversations to develop the young workforce." Wallace High School actively promotes employability as part of the wider curriculum, and our Careers and Apprenticeships Fair is just one example of our work in this area. This is backed up by our employability Twitter feed (@WHS_Futures) which promotes aspirational employability opportunities for Wallace High School pupils. These include insights into college, university, apprenticeships, volunteering, skills and careers.





Family Learning Event...



A key aspect of our commitment to Developing the Young Workforce is supporting all families, so that they are fully informed about career and training opportunities. The way that people work is changing; it is estimated that many young people today will have upwards of ten jobs in their working lives. In November, an Employability Family Learning Event was held to provide parents and carers with a valuable opportunity to discuss their child's future employment.



Our long-standing supporter Gavin Rennie, a senior human resources manager with Prudential, gave an informative account of what employers will *really* want from the workforce of the future. Fiona Lafferty, our Skills Development Scotland careers advisor, continued the session by showing how a range of digital resources (including the My World of Work website) can be accessed at home. Mr Smith, Acting Principal Teacher of Employability and Partnerships, concluded the session by showcasing Employability Family Learning Packs which contain lots of practical resources and activities. These are designed to be used by all families, and will be available at school events throughout the year. This information was also shared with visitors at the successful Cornton Family Learning Event in December, and many positive discussions were held. Family support makes such a difference to our employability strategy, and we fully would appreciate feedback from parents and carers as to how we can continue supporting young people's futures.

Prudential Practice Interviews ...

Twenty senior pupils who are studying Enterprise and Employability undertook a series of practice interviews, to better prepare them for the world for work. Five experienced recruitment experts from our award-winning Prudential partnership gave insights into the employer's view of interviews, and offered useful advice on answering questions by using clear examples. Each interview lasted for ten minutes, and required candidates to answer a series of questions based on a career pathway that they had previously researched in class. Individual feedback was given, before the pupils led a discussion on the impact that this experience had made.

Anne-Louise McTaggart, Customer Service Leader, felt



that this had been an enriching experience. "I'm impressed with the amount of preparation that pupils and teachers at Wallace High School put in to preparing for the outside world", she said. Leona Brown, S₅, learned that the interview process can be made easier with practice. "Although I had thought about this, I was still a bit nervous, but talking to somebody who was interested to hear about my ambitions made a difference", said Leona.



Swimming...

The Wallace Swim Team had their most successful outing to date at the recent Central Schools Swimming Championships, held at the Peak Sports Village. The team, which included a 23 strong squad, finished as the second-placed comprehensive school across Central Scotland, as well as the Relay Team made up of Shona Laverty, Abbie Notman, Garth Eklund and Thomas De Nova finishing first-placed comprehensive school, which was an incredible achievement considering they will be together for another two years.
