#### Play Unified—Makaton...



My name is Jessica Campbell and I am an S5 pupil. Every Tuesday lunchtime I run a Makaton Club. Makaton is a communication aid for young people with additional support needs and it incorporates much more than just signing with your hands. It involves body language, facial features, directions and many other skills. A number of young people and staff have been attending the club and there has been great support with around twenty attendees every week. We are, however, always looking for more people to get involved.

As there are a wide range of people who attend, when asked why they attended the number of reasons were varied. Teachers said it was a good



skill to have while working in the classroom and supporting pupils. One pupil quoted: "It gives a small insight into how these young people go about their lives every day", which is exactly what I wanted to achieve. Through leading the club I was keen for participants to have fun as well as educating people and giving them the confidence to use Makaton. Makaton is not just limited to a classroom, it can be used in practical activities, for example in our Play Unified Club. It can also be used at home or in the workplace, to communicate with family, friends and colleagues, the possibilities are endless. I personally have gained a great deal from not only teaching Makaton but from working with the young people in Ochil House and also one very supportive teacher, Mrs Halliday, who taught me how to use Makaton

#### Visit to Flanders Moss...

On Wednesday the 8th of May a group of our S<sub>3</sub> Art and Music pupils were up bright and early to experience the special wildlife and landscape of Flanders Moss. Arriving at Flanders Moss at 7:30am we found about the landscape and the wildlife of the ancient landscape. We were met and guided by artists of the carse of Stirling and reserve staff from the SNH.

The first task we embarked on was measuring the depth of the peat under our feet so we could understand the ground we were walking on. Then we listened into the many sounds we were hearing on the moss and the beautiful dawn chorus of bird song that we heard early in the morning. Next we set off into teams and the art students started to make sketches of the landscape whilst the music students worked on recording the bird sounds we were hearing. We had a busy morning on the moss and really enjoyed hearing from experts all about the landscape and the animals that lived in it.

To warm up after our visit we were all treated to a breakfast of hot chocolate and sausage sandwiches at West Moss Side Farm. We then spent the rest of the day at the farm, creating our artwork in the lovely studio. In addition, we got to learn about weaving and worked on weaving our own bird, the curlew. When we returned to school our music students worked with Forth Valley College to bring together their bird song and then from there took the bird song back to school where we created our own composition.

The pupils finished off their watercolour drawings and produced some really high quality work. Our completed work is being exhibited in Flanders Moss board walk and at the MacRobert Theatre. This was a great experience to bring the outdoors alive through our art and music creative skills.

# Christmas Concert...

# Operation Wallacea – Dominica 2019...

Summer 2019 sees Wallace High, alongside Dunblane High, embark on their third, 2 week long, conservation research expedition. This time to Dominica in The Caribbean. S5/6 pupils have been busy fundraising and saving up over the last two years and it has finally arrived. This expedition will see the young people taking part in both land and ocean based field work in order to support the Operation Wallacea scientists in their conservation efforts. Both weeks will also involve learning about the islands biodiversity, history and volcanology through a series of lectures.

On September 18th 2017 Dominica was hit by a devastating hurricane. Hurricane Maria hit Dominica at category five speed, with all areas of the island affected. The high winds and rains have had an environmental impact, with early estimates predicted 30% tree loss across the island, with most of the remaining trees losing foliage and branches. The impact on wildlife is currently unknown, so Opwall and its volunteers now have a unique opportunity to study the recovery of the forest after such a big event, and with data from years previous to Maria for comparison.

The research programme in the forest has four main objectives:

• To record and monitor populations of birds, bats, invertebrates and reptiles. Tracking the recovery and changes in species richness after hurricane Maria.

• To investigate the impact of the invasive Puerto Rican crested anole on the endemic Dominican anole.

• To establish a freshwater biotic index for the rivers and streams on the island in order to assess the health of freshwater environments and monitor possible future change. Evidence for the existence of the invasive, non-native crayfish will also be investigated.

• To investigate the effect of ocean acidification on marine invertebrates.

For the second week the teams will be based at Fort Shirley in the north of the island where they will complete either their PADI Open Water dive training or a Caribbean Coral Reef Ecology Course. Everyone involved, including staff, is extremely excited and cannot wait to embark on this experience on the 21<sup>st</sup> June.

Lessons from Auschwitz...



We, Thomas Hanson and Miko Stewart, were selected by the RMPS Department from a group of S6 pupils to take part in the annual Holocaust Educational Trust 'Lessons from Auschwitz' programme in October. The first part of the programme was our Orientation Seminar in Edinburgh, where we met our group who we would travel to Poland with. We also listened to a survivor testimony from Eva Clarke, who told us about her parents' struggle throughout the Holocaust and her miracle birth. The Seminar taught us to think of the victims as individuals and not as a collective group of numbers, which degrades their suffering. Hearing Eva's testimony was an incredible experience and really got us thinking about the scale and the horrors of the Holocaust. Following this we had a one day visit to Poland on Wednesday 3rd October where we reflected on Jewish life in Oswiecim and the loss of the entire community after World War II. We then moved to Auschwitz I which held about 1.1 million Jewish prisoners along with Poles, Gypsies and other ethnic groups. Auschwitz-Birkenau was a short distance from Auschwitz I and was part of a network of concentration and extermination camps under the name 'Auschwitz'. Auschwitz-Birkenau was the place where Jews were murdered in gas chambers, and where they also faced extremely poor sanitary conditions which contributed to many deaths as well. Our follow-up Seminar gave us the chance to reflect on our visit and reminded us of the importance of thinking about the vic-



After the powerful and moving visit to Auschwitz, Miko Stewart and Tom Hanson, were compelled to help others learn from the mistakes of the past. As well as attending workshops in Edinburgh, they put together a presentation on the dangers of racism and prejudice. They both presented this to S2 classes in the RMPS department, sharing their experience and reflections they gave the students plenty to think about.



The Engineering Education Scheme...



Wallace High is the first school to have two teams competing in the Education Enterprise scheme. The scheme involves working with an industry partner to solve a real-world problem for their products. Wallace was extremely fortunate to work with excellent Industry partners in Sonomatic and Calnex. Their help and support was an enlightening experience for our senior pupils.

Our teams were set two very different problems. Sonomatic had to devise and test a method for continuous scanning of pipes in the energy industry while operating at very high temperatures and Calnex a method for charging testing devices while mobile in the field.

Once the project parameters were set the teams had an industry visit plus support visits in school from their industry contacts as they worked on their projects and various solutions over a number of months.

The pupils did an amazing job ending with presentations and questions from industry experts at the national event in Edinburgh. Staff and industry partners were all incredibly impressed by their efforts and final products.

# Dominica 2019...



Seniors from Wallace, alongside seniors from Dunblane, embarked on the next Operation Wallacea expedition in June. This year to the Caribbean island of Dominica. This expedition saw pupils investigating the effects of 2017's Hurricane Maria on the island and to what extent the area has recovered.

Week one saw the team out collecting data, alongside OpWall scientists, on bird & bat populations, freshwater environments, invasive species and insects. The latter of which will go on to become part of the collection of invertebrates in the London Natural History Museum! All data collected will go onto help with conservation efforts in the area. Week two saw the team SCUBA diving or snorkeling, again looking at the impact of Hurricane Maria, this time in the marine environment.

Once qualified in their chosen area pupils were supporting scientists with collecting vital data on the coral reef and species living on the reef. This included attending lectures, carrying out underwater transects and using cameras to carry out stereoscopic surveys. A number of young people gained diving qualifications and the snorkelers got to play their part in a National Geographic study.

All of the young people, and the staff, learned a great deal and fully enjoyed the opportunity to support Operation Wallacea in their conservation efforts on Dominica.
