#### S6 Partnership Conference

On Tuesday 2 June we were delighted to be part of an exciting inaugural partnership conference with over 300 pupils from Bannockburn, Dunblane and Wallace High schools.



Our young people gathered at Dunblane Hydro for the event that included a range of inspirational speakers: Peter Hughes, of Scottish Engineering, Tree of Knowledge and the Scottish Fire Service.

This event is part of an attempt to open up the world beyond school for our S6 pupils and to encourage greater partnership working with our neighbouring schools. We look forward to this going from strength-to-strength in future years.

#### Scottish Fire Service and Anthony Nolan Trust S6 Partnership

One of the critical partnerships to come out of our inaugural S6 Conference with Bannockburn and Dunblane High at Dunblane Hydro on Tuesday 2 June was our work with the Scottish Fire Service and the Anthony Nolan Trust. We have become the first



group of schools to enter into partnership with the Fire Service's East division and the Anthony Nolan Trust to educate young people on becoming bone marrow donors (the legal age for this now being 16).

On 16 June our S6 Champions supported Fire Service personnel with signing up pupils and staff between 16 and 30 for our clinic. This allowed individuals to join the potentially life-saving register. In total, 48 Wallace pupils are now registered and we look forward to expanding this number in the new year and, hopefully, contributing to saving lives.

#### **Go4SET Mathematics Challenge**

Well done to our pupils who took part recently in the Go4SET 110 week project: "My Technology, My Money!" sponsored by the Mastercard and run by the Engineering Development Trust. Our team of girls came up with a concept for a budgeting app which they would like to develop further in the future. They had great support from HSBC, our mentors for the project.

The team Go4Girls attended a Celebration and Assessment day at Herriot Watt University. They have had to present their ideas to assessors and visitors. All pupils gained a silver Crest Award as well as an Industrial Cadets Bronze award.

SCOTS College Course
Thirteen pupils have successfully graduated from the ground-breaking year long School-College
Opportunities to Succeed (SCOTS)
Programme at Forth Valley College.

In partnership with Wallace High School, pupils studied for the SCQF 4 Employability Award with Mr Smith whilst experiencing taster sessions in eight different college courses.

At a special event held at Forth Valley College's Stirling Campus on the evening of Tuesday 9 June, the pupils were joined by their parents, school and college staff and members of Stirling Council – including Provost Mike Robbins, Council Leader Johanna Boyd, David Leng, Director of Children, Young People & Education - Stirling and Clackmannanshire Councils and Ann Floyd, Quality Improvement Officer, Stirling and Clackmannanshire Councils - who were all keen to celebrate the successful programme.

Kaitlyn Cordiner felt that this opportunity had allowed her to develop her skills for learning, life and work. "I am now much more confident working with different people, and I have enjoyed the challenge of trying new courses" she said.



Forth Valley College Principal Dr Ken Thomson, said: "Congratulations must go to all those pupils who have completed the full course and found it to be worthwhile and of great benefit in helping them make the decision as to which study route they might want to take in life. Indeed many of those who took part may apply for a further course here at Forth Valley College and we look forward to seeing them back at the College very soon".

The SCOTS Programme continues with a new group of pupils in August 2015, and interviews are already well underway.

#### **Employability and Lifeskills Programme**

A number of S4 pupils have completed an 'Employability and Lifeskills Programme' this term during our study leave period. This programme ran like a college timetable, with pupils attending each day, but at different times in order to integrate into a more mature, college-style experience. The agencies who worked with the pupils included: Live N learn; Youth Services; Skills Development Scotland; Move On; Fire Service; Police; Barnardo's; Scottish Business in the Community; Marshalls; Prudential; Enterprise Rent-a-Car; Cowane's Hospital and Sheena Walker, a local Business Consultant.

The programme focused on helping students develop their employability skills and their awareness of the workplace, as well as preparing them for independent living and making healthy choices in the future. Thank you to all those who have been involved and given their time and talents to support our pupils.

#### Paris and Belgium Trip 2015









The trip included one night on the ferry with evening meal and breakfast, during which the young people enjoyed a spot of shopping at the duty free and some braver ones displaying their dance moves at the disco. On the morning after, as the group was departing the ship, a fellow passenger commented to one of the teachers on the impressive behaviour of the students from Wallace. On the first day, everyone enjoyed the visit of the Passchendaele museum in Flanders soaking up history and more especially the tour of the WW1 trenches. Later on, there was relaxation on board the Bateaux-mouche whilst admiring Paris 'magnificent monuments along the river Seine, basking in the warm evening sun and a light breeze. The group stayed two nights at the Hotel Kyriad near Disneyland where the rooms were comfortable and the staff were friendly and helpful. The children enjoyed the all-youcan -eat buffet at breakfast readying themselves for very busy days.





The second day was a full day of culture in Paris where time was spent visiting the Eiffel Tower, the Arc de Triomphe, walking down the Champs Elysées and finally getting to see the world famous Mona Lisa at the Louvre Museum. The team were very impressed by the number of pupils making an effort to speak French when ordering their food for lunch. The day ended with a lovely meal at Flam's, a restaurant specialising in traditional dishes called Flammekueche from the Alsace region. Even though they were out of their comfort zone the children were fantastic at trying out and enjoying the various sharing platters. The final day was spent in Disneyland where the sun shone all day and the spirits were high. Pixie dust was in the air! Everybody had a great day.

Despite a tiring return journey including a 2am ferry trip from Calais to Dover, the students kept their good sense of

Higher French & Spanish Trip to the Multilingual Debate at Herriot Watt University By Jamie Dunn and Katie Gordon



On the 25<sup>th</sup> March we went on a trip to Herriot Watt University for the annual Multilingual Debate. The motion was 'This House believes that the rise of the machine will end the era of the linguist'. The debate involved a panel of 6 people debating about the effects of technology on linguistics, 3 were opposed to the motion and 3 were for the motion. It seemed simple enough, however there was a twist: each person on the panel debated in their respective language. On the 'For' team the speakers were German, French and American. On the 'Against' team the speakers were Chinese, English and Spanish. The Chairperson of the debate, who led the event, spoke entirely in Spanish.

As each debater spoke, language students of the university interpreted and translated what they said into several different languages. The students sat in numbered sound proof booths with microphones and as the audience we were able to tune into any language through our earphones using different channels. The range of languages was impressive, with Chinese, Arabic, French, Spanish, German and English used throughout the event. We found the event to be fascinating with many interesting points being made. The range of opinions shared were brilliant and the interpreting students were inspiring in their work. The effort and quality of their skills further encouraging us all to continue with our interest in languages! *¡Lo pasamos bomba!* 

#### **Operation Wallacea**



In partnership with Dunblane High School, pupils from Wallace High embarked on a 2 week trip of a lifetime to South Africa. Primarily designed as a study trip, pupils worked under the auspices of South African conservation and research body "Operation Wallacea" whilst undertaking research on the region's mega *flora* (plant life) and *fauna* (animal life).

The expedition began in the Struwig Eco Reserve located in Balule Game Reserve which is attached to the famous Kruger National Park. The site is operated by WEI (Wildlife Ecological Investments). Pupils and staff spent their first week in the South African bush learning about the ecology of the environment through captivating lectures and exciting fieldwork sessions. The group were encouraged to contribute to the ongoing conservation research by carrying out bird point counts, game transects and habitat assessments. In addition, pupils had the chance for more "recreational" activities such as game drives and treks into the bush. This led to the pupils having some very exciting encounters with a variety of the indigenous wildlife: breeding herds of elephants; (the elusive) black rhino; hyena; baboons; impala; hippo; and Warthog, to name but a few.

Pupils also experienced one night in a basic bush camp, where all that stood between them and the wild South African wilderness was an electrified fence. It was an exciting night listening to lions roar, hyenas call and the, not too distant, trumpet call of an elephant, whilst sitting under a night sky unaffected by light pollution [ie free from the glow from city buildings and street lights], roasting marshmallows over a camp-fire.

When the group wasn't spending their time out of the camp, they were learning about the ecology of the South African bush, current conservation efforts and problems faced. This included getting up close and personal with some insects and studying animal dung, as well as participating in an interesting and conflicting debate on "trophy" hunting.



The experience and enjoyment of the first week was certainly enhanced by the incredible staff team on site in Struwig Eco Reserve. Staff and pupils were enthralled by their experiences in South Africa. The knowledge, images and stories will live with them long beyond the end of this amazing experience.







The group left the bush and headed to Sodwana Bay to begin their second week: Marine Week. Sodwana is situated in the Maputaland Marine Reserve and is the only scuba diving area along the Greater St Lucia Wetlands Park coastline. Classified as one of the top dive sites in the world, this 50km reef complex boasts around 95 species of hard and soft coral, sponges, other invertebrates and around 1200 species of fish. The accommodation during this week was slightly more basic with everyone sleeping in tents, rather than the 'more comfortable' bunk beds they were used to from the first week.

The second week was more individualised, allowing each person the choice of which activities to undertake during their time in Sodwana. Pupils who had previously not undertaken their scuba diving course were able to complete their PADI Open Water Course. Following on from this, they were able to join the pupils who were already qualified to scuba dive, to get up close and personal with some of Sodwana Bays interesting *flora* and *fauna*. This group had the opportunity to dive alongside sea turtles, investigate coral formation and witness the many tropical fish varieties in their natural habitat.



The snorkelers also had an incredible second week with many snorkel trips involving the chance to swim with wild bottlenose dolphins, as well as the occasional sightings of humpback whales and spinner dolphins. This was made all the more exciting by the white knuckle speedboat ride over the waves to get to the dive sites.

Between trips to the water, the group had the chance to top up their tans, play games on the beach, visit the local market, go on sand dune ecology walks, learn about rock pools, attend a talk on sea turtles and visit the small café for a "local special."

During the evenings, the group was able to participate in more lectures, increasing their learning of the reef ecology of Sodwana Bay, as well as current conservation issues facing coral reefs around the world.

The final night in Sodwana Bay became a night to remember as a local Zulu dance group came and put on an incredible performance that made the group incredibly sad to be leaving. The experience of the expedition has left pupils and staff with



lasting memories of their journey to an incredible country with two very different eco-systems. This knowledge and understanding will hopefully influence the thinking of our young people during their lifetime allowing them to have a greater appreciation of the world in which we live. The staff team extends a massive thanks to all participants for their excellent conduct and sense of group spirit, which made the trip a very enjoyable adventure.







#### Wallace High School Knex Challenge Final 2015

Cornton Primary School have been crowned the winners of the Knex Challenge for 2015. Dylan, Erin, Grace and Tara were delighted to become the first winners from Cornton Primary and their victory was fully deserved.



Over the past academic year the Science Faculty at Wallace High School has welcomed every Primary 6 pupil in our cluster to take part in the first round heats – that's well over 300 pupils from Fallin, Raploch, Cornton, Riverside and Bridge of Allan competing for a place in the final. 40 pupils made up the final 11 teams for the Grand Final.

The students were given two hours to develop and build a scale model bridge which has to meet some challenging specifications. Not only does the bridge need to meet the strict design standards but teams are also judged on their co-operative and team working skills, organisation and time management. A team of three judges then assess the bridges and the teams during a reflective discussion.

The winning team explained that they found some inspiration from their recent topic, which involved learning about the legendary Isambard Kingdom Brunel. Their model reflected some of his ingenious ideas but with a modern decorative twist. The design would allow both cars and trains to cross and the team were articulate in their discussion.

The team will now have the summer to celebrate their win with a trip to Blair Drummond Safari Park and Camera Obscura's World of Illusions before moving on to Primary 7. Mr Rough from the Science Faculty reflected:

"The standard of work and effort seems to get better and better with every year we run this competition. All of our associate Primary Schools and their teams have been an absolute credit to themselves and their schools throughout this competition and it is incredibly exciting to see just how many unique, talented and skilled young people we have out there in our learning community"

Mr McCormick noted: "It is clear that even at this young stage, so many young learners have ideas, abilities and skills which will make them hugely successful in STEM related subjects in later school years." And Miss Stewart also added: "The Knex challenge is not only a superbly valuable transitional experience but it is a fun, engaging and creative way for us to work with the pupils in our cluster. We are excited that these are our future Wallace Science students".



#### Barnardo's Social Influence Project



Barnardo's have been working with the Department of RMPS to challenge the influence that society has on the lives of young people. This 'Social Influence Programme' looked at how the public have 'got it wrong' when it comes to the way young people behave.

S2 and S3 classes who were involved surveyed their own class and found that the press and many others don't appreciate that most young people do not get involved in risk behaviours.

They then designed posters to highlight the high percentage of young people who in fact don't drink, smoke, do drugs, etc. Barnardo's have selected their favourite posters and they have been professionally produced by a graphic artist and will be presented as framed prints to the school. #### Arichi Science Prize 2015

Congratulations to Mia Dawson who has won the 2015 Arichi Prize with her outstanding project: Off the Grid. Each year our students are challenged to produce a Science model or communication that explores and answers the growing concerns of the global energy crisis.



The project – in honour of Professor Shizuo Arichi who is now retired and lives in Japan – has been running for over 20 years. In her project, Mia has not only explored the many modern methods used to conserve energy but she has also raised awareness of the moral and ethical issues in global energy.

The context of her project was to highlight the difficulties faced in countries in the developing world:

"I wanted to make sure that people know just how difficult it is for people to have access to something as simple as light".

Mia cleverly explained that by installing simple water bottles on the thatched roofs of housing this allows refraction of light into the otherwise dark rooms below. The bottles are also filled with water and bleach agents to restrict the build-up of algae and moulds.

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Her model home was also equipped with solar panels and a solar furnace for cooking:

"Everyone should have equal access to energy and African Farmers, for example, should have the ability to communicate with the world to run their businesses. I also wanted to raise awareness of just how hard people need to work for energy".

Mia, along with seventy other students who were graded as Highly Commended or Excellent, have been rewarded for their efforts with a trip to Glasgow Science Centre at the end of term.



This is the greatest ever number of students who have fallen into this category for the annual competition.

Other projects included children's board games, educational books and videos and even a working model wind turbine. Mr Rough, Faculty Manager of Science, added:

"Mia's project is not only of the highest quality in terms of the Science and Technology involved but it is unique in that it takes us into the developing world. She has done a fantastic job of raising these issues. All of our S1 have had a fantastic year in Science and this is another example of how Wallace High Pupils are demonstrating their skills and talents in STEM areas".



#### School Show—Little Shop of Horrors

As the curtain was about to fall on another busy and rewarding school year, the final act was about to be played out.

For two nights in the last week of term Little Shop of Horrors took centre stage, as the young people of Wallace High presented an excellent, truly collaborative school show to near sell-out audiences.
